 Seniors are entitled to a \$20 per month standard deduction, and must also meet an asset test.
 There is no income upper limit or deductible for disabled children or disabled working adults.
 Add fetus to family size of pregnant woman.
 The Senior deductible income standard is \$522 per mo. for an individual; \$650 per mo. for a couple.
 The income standard for institutionalized individuals is \$60 per month.
